I always enjoy my lunch and am so impressed with the team who are always ready with a smile and a kind word for everyone. Thank you ladies, we really do appreciate you.


Marking Ramadan

Ο In the Footsteps of the Lady with the Lamp This week Year 2 were transported back in time to 1854 where they found themselves in the middle of the Crimean War. Visiting Scutari Hospital they joined 'the Lady with the lamp', Florence Nightingale, in her mission to treat many of the injured and sick casualties. The children set to cooking wholesome and nutritious meals for the wounded soldiers, providing clean and hygienic wards, learning basic First Aid and bandaging techniques, and teaching the trainee nurses about the importance of keeping rats and other vermin out of the hospital. Having made their own authentic lamps, the children also had a zoom call with Mary Seacole. Mary Seacole was another inspirational woman pioneer in the field of medicine and health care. She was a contemporary of Florence Nightingale who did amazing work caring for the injured soldiers on the front line in the Crimean War. Everyone had a great time in their role-play, learning many new facts and developing a better under-standing of the important role Florence Nightingale played in developing the country's health service and the modern standards of nursing we have come to expect today. The children joined together at the end of the day to share the nutritious vegetable soup they had created. 

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A Reminder About School Uniform

Spring is upon us and everything is growing, including the children who all seem to be having a growth spurt. Consequently, I know many of you are already thinking about purchasing new uniform for your child/children over the coming weeks. Our uniform is very important to us as it instils a sense of pride and sets the same high level of expectation we ask the children to apply to their work. As a school we aim to make our school uniform as simple and affordable as possible so please can we take this opportunity to remind you of the requirements.

- Knee length grey skirt, grey school trousers or grey school shorts.
- Dark green sweatshirt or cardigan
- Black school shoes—not trainers

Trousers and skirts should be GREY and not black. Black leggings are not acceptable items of school uniform. Children will need sensible black school shoes (not Ugg style boots or shoes) and additionally a spare pair of shoes, boots or wellingtons to change into when playing on the field at lunchtimes.


We will be reminding children of our expectations regarding school uniform and would ask you to support us in reinforcing these expectations.
