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Being Inclusive

In my assembly on Monday I talked to the children about being inclusive and asked them to think about what a visitor to our school might see and how they would know we are an inclusive community. As always, the children came up with fabulous answers and examples. I then asked if anyone had ever felt excluded because someone had said something unkind to them online. The response shocked me as nearly every hand in the hall shot up. Children went on to give examples of how small arguments on social media groups had escalated into huge dramas in which they were castigated and excluded.

I am sure you are all aware of the current debates in parliament and the measures that Ofcom is implementing to improve children's safety online and ensure children are not accessing harmful content. Despite apps such as WhatsApp, Instagram and Snapchat having an age requirement of 13, most children have accounts which are enabled by their parents. Where parents have enabled their child to use such social media platforms, it is recommended that they should closely monitor who their child is talking to and the nature of the conversations they are having. Children who are under the age limit for these apps should not be using them unaccompanied and a trusted adult should carefully monitor the content of 'chat' to ensure that children are not using inappropriate language with one another and that the nature of the conversation is appropriate. Keeping our children safe both physically and online is of the utmost importance and we must work together to ensure our children are using any online platforms appropriately, safely and with kindness.

the garden before returning to school.


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County Lines Seminar

A Polite Reminder About Jewellery and Nail Varnish

With the arrival of the sunny weather we have seen an increase in the number of children wearing bracelets and other items of jewellery together with nail varnish. For health and safety reasons jewellery and elaborate hair ornaments should not be worn to school. The only exceptions are watches and small studs for pierced ears. All jewellery items, including 'fitbits', MUST be removed during PE lessons and hair must be tied back to prevent injury. Children should remove their own earrings and store them safely or parents should remove them before the start of the school day. The Local Authority Health and Safety guidance no longer permits the taping of pierced ears during PE lessons. Staff cannot remove earrings for children or be responsible for storing them. As an alternative, silicone studs may be worn during PE lessons. Please can you check that all bracelets, bangles and necklaces are removed before your child comes to school each day and that nail varnish is removed following the weekend. Thank you for your support in this matter.
