United Kingdom	The four countries of the U.K. are England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland
Towns and Cities	Towns and cities are built up areas in the U.K. where there are lots of people, buildings and traffic.
Countryside	The countryside in the U.K. is quiet and not built up. There are small villages and not many people.
Arable	Arable farms grow crops like wheat, barley, maize, apples, cabbages and beans.
Livestock	Livestock farms raise animals like cows, pigs and sheep.
Dairy	Dairy farms keep cows to produce milk.

<p>Arable farms grow crops such as wheat, fruit and vegetables.</p> 	<p>Livestock farms keep animals for meat. Sheep are also kept for their wool and chickens are also kept for their eggs.</p> 	<p>Dairy farms produce any food that can be made from milk, such as cream, yoghurt, cheese and, of course, milk.</p>
