Rhyming Fun!

This half-term, one of our learning themes is rhyming words. We have been reading lots of rhyming stories such as 'Oi Frog' by Kes Gray and 'Green and Ham' by Dr Seuss, thinking about the words which sound the same. We have also been playing some rhyming games and puzzles.

Nursery rhymes are a great way to develop early language and literacy skills, so it really helps your child if you sing rhymes with them at home regularly. You could also read some rhyming stories together or just have fun making up silly rhyming strings, such as 'cat, mat, wat, lat'! All of these activities will help your child gain an awareness of rhyme.
